

In honor of Black History Month, we are encouraging our bright minds to become true historians, poets, inventors, writers and more! Students can choose to do any of the six project ideas below. Rubrics for each project are attached.

Students will be required to do a presentation on their project. The format of their presentation will vary depending on the project he/she chooses. This Black History Month project will be considered a "project" grade for Social Studies, ELA (Grammar), and Reading.

#### 1 Become a Poet!

Way before hip-hop and rap, famous black poets like Langston Hughes, Maya Angelou, Nikki Giovanni, Gwendolyn Brooks, etc. wrote beautiful poems that spoke about Black heritage.

Choose a famous Black poet to research, and memorize one of his/her poems. Be ready to recite the poem to the class! You can do it! :)

#### 3 Become an Activist! 4 Become a Journalist!

We would not be able to have the diverse school and classroom we have today were it not for people who fought our rights like Deray McKesson, Ruby Bridges, Martin Luther King, Jr., Nat Turner, Harriet Tubman, etc.

Choose a Black activist from the past (or present) to research! Create a protest poster that exhibits (shows) their beliefs.

# 5 Become an Artist!

From Jean-Michel Basquiat to Faith Ringgold, our country would not be what it is today without the contributions of Black artists.

Choose one artist to research, and create a portrait of the artist using either a ceiling tile, or a canvas! Be prepared to present your portrait, and describe the Black artist's life.

#### 2 Become a Historian!

Ever wanted to travel back in time? The Harlem Renaissance of the 1920s, is an example of a vibrant time for African-Americans where many new inventions, art, scholars, and music were created.

Become a historian and explore this time period! Create a poster to showcase your research.

Famous Black journalists like Monica Pearson, Al Roker, Ida B. Wells or even Wendy Williams all gather information on an event, person or community. Now it's your turn!

Come up with juicy questions and interview an African-American you admire! It can be mom, grandma, a teacher, family friend, entrepreneur, etc! Then create a poster on his/her life.

#### 6 Become an Inventor!

Ever use an ironing board? Ever seen your parents stop at a traffic light? Ever eaten peanut butter? All of these things were created by Black inventors!

Choose one inventor to research, and make a presentation on his/her life, an explanation of the invention, and its importance. Then, create a model replica of the invention!

1 Page Summary Grammatically Correct (Correct Punctuation, Capital Letters, Subject and Verb in each sentence; words spelled correctly)	/10 points
